## Final Reflection Due Monday 5/3/10

We tend to think of ourselves as being "normal," and believe that we are just like most other people in a fundamental way. Usually this assumption is true. I think about food, you think about food. I daydream when I should be listening, you daydream when you should be listening. Etc.
